Each member coach can go to our website each day and get the play of the day. Bi-monthly coaches' in-service articles will continue beginning in October and run through April.

The IBCA was excited to take over management of the Indiana-Kentucky All-Star Series this past summer. Right at 6,000 people were in attendance and \$33,000 was raised for various charities, including the Indiana National Guard. We are fortunate and appreciate Best Choice Home Health for coming on board as the presenting sponsor of this event for the next few years.

A special thanks to the All-Star Games Director Charlie Hall and special projects cocoordinator Pat McKee for their efforts. This successful transition could not have been possible without the many IBCA Board Members who volunteered their time to help where ever needed. A Junior All-Star game vs. Kentucky has been added to the tradition of this event.

This summer will be the Diamond Anniversary, 75 years, (1939-2013) that an Indiana All-Star team has been selected. The first game vs. Kentucky began in 1940. Watch for future information about a special Diamond Anniversary celebration.

This past spring because of pressure from the state legislature, the IHSAA conducted various town hall meetings to allow the public to express their view about single-class vs. multiple-class basketball. The majority of the people in attendance at the town hall meetings supported single-class basketball. In an IHSAA survey after the town hall meetings concluded, a majority of the players, principals and ADs supported the present four-class system. The coaches' vote was a near 50/50 split on the issue. The IHSAA has gone on record that the only way change can take place is if the IBCA makes a proposal for change.

The IBCA's position is that this issue does not have to be an "either/or" scenario (single class vs. multiple class), but that there are some interesting compromise ideas out there that need to be investigated.

The IBCA is creating a committee to study these compromise ideas. The committee will identify two or three of the best compromises, and all member coaches will get an opportunity to express their viewpoint in a survey.

Keep in mind, we probably need at least 70 percent support for a compromise idea before the IHSAA will seriously consider a change. Similar support from the principals and ADs is necessary before any change is possible. The IBCA goal is to get this survey out to all coaches by mid-October. This is your chance for input. Please complete this survey in a timely fashion, so your voice can be heard.

January again will be Coaches vs. Cancer month for High School Basketball in Indiana. High School Coaches in Indiana have stepped up and embraced this program, raising more than \$500,000 for cancer research in the past five years. Thanks for being a great role model for your team and community by helping fight this deadly disease.

We all belong to a great profession. Coaches have the opportunity to make a positive impact on the lives of the young people we serve even well beyond the field of competition. Regardless of the criticism we sometimes receive or the support we receive or don't receive from parents, administration and community, young people always will need coaches. Good luck this season.

### IBCA/Subway Player of the Week program

About 100 high school boys and girls will have the opportunity to win IBCA/Subway Player of the Week recognition in 2012-13.

Initiated in 2008-09 thanks to support from the Indiana Pacers and Indiana Fever, these awards were given to deserving boys and girls who had outstanding weeks during the last four seasons. Last season alone, 104 players – 56 boys and 48 girls – were cited.

For the coming season, plans are for at least one boy and one girl from each of the three IHSAA districts are honored each week, so long as there are nominees for the awards. The IBCA would prefer that nominations come from coaches of potential winners or from media in those areas. Coaches are to be IBCA members to nominate players.

To submit a nominee, please e-mail info to IBCA Director of Special Projects Pat McKee (patmckee77@aol.com) by noon Monday each week of the playing season (girls from Nov. 12 through March 4; boys from Nov. 26 through March 25).

If you nominate a player, please include the player's name, school, grade, height, position, year in school and a recap of the player's performance in his/her game or games of the preceding week, Monday through Saturday. Please also include the coach's name, e-mail address and best phone number to reach the coach

After all players are selected during a given week, they will be added to a growing list of IBCA/Subway High School Players of the Week. The weekly listings will be posted no later than noon Tuesday. Coaches and/or Athletic Directors of the weekly winners will be notified by Pat McKee.

The first deadline for reports for the coming season will be noon on Monday, Nov. 12 for girls and noon on Monday, Nov. 26 for boys. These will continue each week through the Monday following the IHSAA Boys and Girls State Finals



### January is 'Coaches vs. Cancer' month

The IBCA again has designated January as "Coaches vs. Cancer" month for high school Basketball in Indiana. In the first five years of this initiative, boys' and girls' coaches across Indiana raised nearly \$500,000. In 2011-12 coaches, teams and communities stepped up to raise \$113,000. That makes the five-year total from Indiana basketball coaches more than \$473,000.

For 2012-13, ideally pick a date in January for a "Coaches vs. Cancer" game. If not January, please pick a date that works for you and host a "Coaches vs. Cancer" game.

The American Cancer Society also will present banners to programs that meet certain levels of donations. Categories are Champion (\$10,000 or more), MVP (\$5,000 to \$9,999) and All Star (\$2,500 to \$4,999).

In August 2012, the American Cancer Society recognized coaches from Carroll (Flora), Columbus North and South Dearborn as top schools for 2011-12 with a golf outing and dinner hosted by Notre Dame men's basketball coach Mike Brey.

This January, we are asking every IBCA boys' and girls' coach to select a game to promote "Coaches vs. Cancer."

All participating schools will be recognized this year on www.coachesvscancerindiana.org; those raising a total of \$2,500 or more through all sports will receive a "Coaches vs. Cancer" recognition banner imprinted with the school's name. To be eligible, all funds raised from throughout the school year must be turned into the local American Cancer Society office no later than June 1, 2013.

"We are very proud of Indiana high schools," said American Cancer Society Coaches vs. Cancer specialist Tara Miller, who helps coordinate the state's effort among IBCA coaches. "And we are extremely proud of our partnership with the IBCA in this extraordinary campaign.

"The commitment of the coaches, teams, parents and participants makes a real impact in the lives of those touched by the disease. We are truly grateful for the continued support. By working together, we can all join the team to create a world with less cancer and more birthdays."

# New NCAA Division I academic requirements for Class of 2016

The NCAA has released an SAT/ACT sliding scale that corresponds with the increased GPA requirements for the class of 2016 and beyond. Any current high school freshman who is even remotely considering the possibility of playing a sport collegiately needs to pay attention. The wiggle room to correct academic shortcomings has been greatly reduced.

Here is a summary if the NCAA Division I academic requirements for a Full Qualifier that take effect for the class of 2016 and beyond:

The minimum core course GPA has increased from 2.00 to 2.30. 10 of the 16 core course requirements must be satisfied prior to the start of the senior year.

 $\vec{7}$  of those 10 core courses must be from English, Math and Science subsections.

Grades earned in the 10 core courses are "locked in" for the purposes of calculating the final core course GPA.

Any retakes of the first 10 core courses must be completed prior to senior year.

The NCAA also has introduced a new status for the class of 2015 – the "Academic Redshirt." An "Academic Redshirt" may receive a scholarship and practice with his/her team, but he/she may not participate in game competition as a college freshman. Students with a GPA of 2.30 or above may achieve either "Academic Redshirt" or "Full Qualifier" status, depending on their SAT/ACT test scores. Students with a core course GPA between 2.00 and 2.29 cannot attain "Full Qualifier" status but may achieve "Academic Redshirt" status by meeting minimum sliding scale test score requirements.

The new sliding SAT/ACT scale results in significant changes in minimum test score requirements. The minimum SAT score required to compete as a college freshman increased by 180 points while the minimum ACT score increased by an average of 14 points (sum score).

Here are two examples of changes to the new sliding scale:

#### Example 1

Prior to 2016: 2.00 core course GPA + 1010 SAT or 86 ACT = Full Qualifier 2016 and after: 2.00 core course GPA + 1020 SAT or 86 ACT = Academic Redshirt

#### Example 1

Prior to 2016: 2.50 core course GPA + 820 SAT or 68 ACT = Full Qualifier 2016 and after: 2.50 core course GPA + 1000 SAT or 85 ACT = Full Qualifier Remember, the NCAA does not include the writing component of the SAT or ACT and the ACT score is a sum score (not average) of the English, math, reading and science sections.

Finally, just because a student-athlete meets the minimum NCAA academic standards, it does not mean they will be admitted to play sports at the college of their choice. Many universities have academic standards for incoming freshman athletes that are higher than the NCAA minimum requirements.

What does all this mean? Student-athletes must start tracking courses early. A student-athlete should calculate his/her initial core course GPA at the conclusion of his/her first semester in high school and continue to do so each semester thereafter.

Now more than ever, every semester counts.







## 2012-2013 Coaching Changes

From the end of last season through late September, 165 people have been hired as new varsity basketball coaches in Indiana high schools -- 79 to boys basketball positions and 86 to girls basketball positions -- for the 2012-13 season.

The number of changes is greater than the 2011 off-season, but the total is well short of the 188 changes made in the spring and summer of 2007.

According to data compiled by HickoryHusker.com, here are the number of changes for the 13 years prior to the 2012 offseason: 2011 - 154; 2010 - 162; 2009 - 146; 2008 - 148; 2007 - 188; 2006 - 152; 2005 - 146; 2004 - 147; 2003 - 141; 2002 - 135; 2001 - 139; 2000 - 125; 1999 - 129; 1998 - 133.

### All-Star Report

The Indiana All-Star series went through some exciting changes in 2012. Even though the series always has belonged to Indiana high school coaches because you have developed the great talent that has given us a competitive edge over Kentucky, the IBCA now is in charge of producing all aspects of the games.

We also added a home-and-home Junior All-Star series with Kentucky. Kentucky moved their game from Bellarmine to Freedom Hall and almost doubled their attendance.

Every high school coach who joins his/her state's high school coaches association automatically becomes a member of the National High School Basketball Coaches Association.

The National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) officially recognizes the NHSBCA. The NABC also allows a high school representative on its congress and offers a reduced-price membership to the NABC (from \$70 to \$29.50) for all high school coaches who are members of his/her high school state coaches association.

During its 2012 summer meeting, the NHSBCA hired David Ginsberg as its first executive director. Ginsberg is from Michigan, is a retired administrator and former high school and college coach.

Louis Stout, president of the Amateur Athletic Union and former commissioner of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association, spoke. His main message was that AAU is not the enemy of high school basketball and that there is more common ground between AAU coaches and high school coaches than we realize. (Stout, 73, passed away on Sept. 9 after becoming ill in August.)

A deal was worked out with the Winning Hoops group to provide the "Play of the Day" to every high school-member coach. As most of you know, this now is a feature on the IBCA website.

It also was decided to organize a National Rising Senior Tournament to be held in Indianapolis in July 2013. At this time, 12 states are committed to this event. More information on this event will be coming soon.

The NHSBCA officers include Greg Grantham, president, North Carolina; David Archer, past president, New York; Steve Witty, vice president/treasurer, Indiana; Rich Czeslawski, communications director, Illinois.





## NFHS rule changes for 2012-13

Participation and fan interest in high school basketball remain strong throughout the nation, and the National Federation of State High School Associations' Basketball Rules Committee voted to retain one aspect of the sport that makes it unique from other levels of play.

At its 2012 meeting on April 16-18 in Indianapolis, the committee considered a proposal to add a shot clock to the high school rules but agreed that the sport played by about one million boys and girls in approximately 18,000 high schools is functioning well without it.

Although a shot clock has been employed at the college level for many years, results of the questionnaire that is sent to coaches, officials and state association administrators across the country did not indicate a strong desire to use the clock at the high school level.

'In addition to the fact that there is some concern about the costs associated with the use of a shot clock, the committee also expressed a belief that the game is typically played with an up-tempo style even without a shot clock," said Kent Summers, director of performing arts and sports at the NFHS. "In addition, the committee believes that coaches should have the option of a slower-paced game if they believe it makes their team more competitive in specific situations. This could be especially true for smaller schools with limited budgets, which comprise a significant number of the 18,000 basketball-playing schools. Since the NFHS writes rules for all sizes of schools and teams, it has to consider what is best for the masses."

The committee did approve one rule change and two major editorial changes, which subsequently were approved by the NFHS Board of Directors.

Rule 2-12 will now require the official scorer to wear a black-and-white vertically striped garment. Previously, this was a recommendation for schools.

"The players, coaches and officials need to be able to quickly and easily identify the official scorer, and making this a requirement should assist in that regard," Summers said.

One of the editorial revisions approved by the committee concerns changes made last year in a team-control foul. The following language will be added to Rule 4-19-7: "  $\dots$  including a member of the throw-in team from the start of the throw-in until player control is obtained inbounds."

The committee noted that the team-control rule change last season introduced an unnecessary level of complexity to a number of rules. This additional language will allow all rules affected by the team-control definition change last season to revert to previous verbiage.

The other editorial change is Rule 2-2-4, which expands the timeframe for state associations to intercede in the event of unusual incidents from after a game, to before and during a contest.

In addition, the Basketball Rules Committee approved four points of emphasis for the 2012-13 season: 1) closely guarded situations; 2) contact above the shoulders; 3) intentional fouls; and 4) guidelines to enforce illegal contact. Points of emphasis are specific rules that need more attention by players, coaches and officials.

Basketball is the second-most popular sport for girls and third-most popular for boys at the high school level, according to the 2010-11 High School Athletics Participation Survey conducted by the NFHS, with 438,933 girls and 545,844 boys participating nationwide. The sport ranks first in school sponsorship of girls and boys teams with 17,767 schools sponsoring the sport for girls and 18,150 sponsoring the sport for boys.
