2012 CLINIC FEATURES

Items such as a Coaches' Roundtable, an Issues & Answers Forum plus a session on teaching Free Throw Technique from former Valparaiso High School coach Virgil Sweet highlight the agenda for the 2012 Indiana Basketball Coaches Association Spring Clinic.

Of course, outstanding speakers – this year Michigan State's Tom Izzo, Butler's Beth Couture, Valparaiso's Bryce Drew and IUPUI's Todd Howard - remain a staple for the twoday gathering that is set for April 27-28 at Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis.

Sessions begin at 11:45 a.m. Friday, April 27 and run through 10:20 p.m. that evening. Sessions resume at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, April 28 and conclude at 12:30 p.m. Cost to attend the clinic is \$50 for current IBCA members and \$75 for non-members.

The Coaches' Roundtable tips off the Clinic agenda and will feature Hall of Fame inductees Mike Broughton, Jim Miller and Ed Siegel on a panel moderated by Indiana SportsTalk host Bob Lovell. The three coaches will discuss steps that they took to make their programs successful for the long run, and questions from those in attendance will be encouraged. (More on these three coaches can be found elsewhere in this E-newsletter.)

Nine of this year's 12 IBCA Coaches of the Year also will speak during the program (more on all 12 IBCA Coaches of the Year can be found elsewhere in this E-Newsletter). Hebron's John Steinhilber, Griffith's Tom Golumbeck and Fort Wayne Canterbury's Scott Kreiger are other high school coaches who will speak at this year's clinic.




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2012 CLINIC SPEAKERS

Tom Izzo, Michigan State University

Tom Izzo is in his 17th season as Michigan State men's basketball coach, and his Spartans have compiled an impressive list of accomplishments, including the 2000 NCAA champions, seven Big Ten regular-season championships, three Big Ten Tournament championships, 15 consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, 10 Sweet Sixteen spots and six Final Four berths.



is a four-time National Coach of the Year who has graduated 81 percent of his players who completed their eligibility. He has had six All-Americans, 12 NBA draft picks, six first-round NBA draft picks and 25 all-Big Ten players.

In 2009, Izzo passed Jud Heathcote (340 wins) to become MSU's all-time winningest coach. His teams made six Final Fours between 1999 and 2010. becoming just the fourth school to do so in any 12-year span. He has an overall win percentage of .709. This was his 29th season in East Lansing, the first 12 as an assistant to Heathcote.

The 57-year-old coach also is a leader off the floor, serving as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches in 2010-11. Izzo also is a member of the John R. Wooden Award Board of Governors and the USA Basketball Collegiate Committee.

Four current NCAA Division I head coaches are former Izzo assistants. That group include's Indiana's Tom Crean, South Florida's Stan Heath, Georgia Tech's Brian Gregory and Tulsa's Doug Wojcik. Current assistant Mike Garland was a head coach at Cleveland State after a previous stint as an Izzo assistant, and former assistants Stan Joplin and Jim Boylen have been head coaches at Toledo and Utah. respectively.

Izzo joined the MSU coaching staff as a part-time assistant in 1983. A Spartans' assistant from 1983-86, Izzo left in May 1986 to become the top assistant at Tulsa. But one month later, he returned to MSU when Mike Deane departed Michigan State to become head coach at Siena. Izzo took over as head coach for the 1995-96 season.

Izzo came to Michigan State from Northern Michigan, where he served as an assistant from 1979-83. Izzo played guard at NMU from 1973-77 and was voted the team's MVP as a senior. He was a third-team NCAA Division II All-American, then coached one season at Ishperning (Mich.) High School before moving to the college ranks, Izzo was inducted into the NMU Hall of Fame in 1990 and was installed in the Upper Peninsula Hall of Fame in 1998. He has delivered commencement addresses and received honorary degrees at both NMU and MSU.

Izzo and his wife, Lupe, have two adult children – Raquel and Steven.

Beth Couture, Butler University

Beth Couture has helped Butler University become one of the premier women's basketball program's in the Midwest.

Fresh off her 10th season with the Bulldogs, Couture's teams have compiled a 161-144 record. Her tenure has included a stretch of four consecutive 20-win seasons, six straight winning seasons and three consecutive postseason Women's NIT berths.



Couture has a career mark of 419-261, including 13 seasons at Presbyterian College (S.C.), and her three-year

Butler string of postseason appearances is a program first since the Bulldogs moved to NCAA Division I in 1984-85. Her top season at Butler came in 2009-10, when the Bulldogs went 23-10 and qualified for the WNIT. The year before, Butler went 20-12 and made the WNIT second round. The 'Dogs also made the WNIT in 2010-11.

During Courture's tenure, the Bulldogs have had 10 players selected to all-Horizon League teams, five chosen to the all-newcomer squad and six picked for the all-defensive team. She has had six players score more than 1,000 career points and five players pursue overseas opportunities as professional players.

Couture became a college head coach in 1989-90 at Presbyterian. She went 258-117 with eight 20-win seasons and six NCAA Division II berths, four times earning South Athletic Conference Coach of the Year. She previously was an assistant for two seasons at Presbyterian after compiling a 49-28 record as head coach at Due West (S.C.) Dixie High School in three years.

A native of Greenville, S.C., Couture is a 1984 graduate of Erskine College where she was a four-time basketball team MVP and a Kodak All-American as a senior. She was inducted into the Erskine Hall of Fame in 1989. She earned her bachelor's degree at Erskine and a master's degree at Furman University in 1987.

Personally, Couture has overcome adversity. She was diagnosed with breast cancer in April 2009, then went through chemotherapy and radiation treatments to return to the court by November 2009. She has been cancer-free since 2010 and has become a community leader in the fight against the disease. She was recognized as Butler's 2010 Woman of Distinction for her role in battling the disease.

Bryce Drew, Valparaiso University

Bryce Drew recently completed his first season as Valparaiso University head coach following six seasons as an assistant coach at the school.

He opened in fine fashion, leading the Crusaders to a 22-12 season as a first-year boss that included a Horizon League regular-season championship and a postseason NIT berth. The successes led to Drew being named HL Coach of the Year as well as two VU players being recognized with first-team all-



league honors and one of them (junior Ryan Broekhoff) earning accolades as HL Player of the Year. This all occurred with a team that was picked to finish fifth in the HL in the preseason.

Drew played at Valparaiso for his father, Homer, becoming the school's most decorated player by leading the team to three NCAA Tournaments, hitting one of the most famous shots in NCAA Tournament history in a 1988 upset of Mississippi (a play that won an ESPY) and then going to the NBA for a six-year career with the Houston Rockets, Chicago Bulls and Charlotte/New Orleans Hornets.

He started 41 games for the Bulls and averaged 6.3 points and 3.9 assists in 2000-01, and he completed his NBA career with 1.081 points and hitting 37 percent of his 3-point attempts. He also was honored in 1999 by the NBA with its Henry P. Iba Citizen Athlete Award for Sportsmanship.

Drew joined the VU coaching staff in 2005-06 and helped the Crusaders to 102 wins over six seasons, including a 23-win season in 2010-11. During his tenure as an assistant coach, he has coached 13 players who went on to play professional basketball overseas.

A graduate of Valparaiso High School, Drew was named Indiana's Mr. Basketball in 1994 immediately made an impact at VU. He was Mid-Continent Conference Newcomer of the Year, four times won all-league honors. three times was Mid-Con Tournament MVP and twice was Mid-Con league MVP. He capped his career by being named third-team All-American as a senior. He also played for a U.S. team that won the World University Games in 1997.

Drew twice is a member of the VU Hall of Fame, inducted individually in 2003 and as part of the 1998 Sweet Sixteen team in 2009. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in sports management.

The 37-year-old coach and his wife, Tara, reside in Valparaiso.

Todd Howard, IUPUI

Todd Howard recently finished his first season as head coach at IUPUI, directing the Jaguars to a 14-18 mark that included a 7-11 slate in the Summit League. In his inaugural campaign, he had one player (senior Alex Young) chosen firstteam all-conference and another (sophomore Ian Chiles) picked to the all-newcomer squad.



Howard became the seventh coach in IUPUI history in April 2011 when he was selected to succeed Ron Hunter, for whom he had served as an assistant for 16 seasons, the last 10 as associ-

ate head coach. Before his promotion, Howard had been recognized by Hoop Scoop and Fox Sports as one of the top assistant/associate coaches among mid-major programs.

Howard long has been a key factor in IUPUI's success, including a schoolbest 26-win season in 2007-08 and the program's first NCAA Division I postseason win in 2010. He also helped recruit talented players such as George Hill, who went onto become a Summit League Player of the Year, get drafted in the NBA first round by the San Antonio Spurs and now plays for the Indiana Pacers. Hill is one of seven Indiana All-Stars signed out of high school by IUPUI since Howard became associate head coach.

Also since that move, IUPUI has captured or played for six league titles, produced two league Players of the Year, two Newcomers of the Year, a Sixth Man of the Year and a Defensive Player of the Year.

A native of Louisville, Howard is a 1989 graduate of Louisville Ballard High School and helped his team win a Kentucky state title in 1988. He went on to play at the University of Louisville for Hall of Fame coach Denny Crum on teams that twice won Metro Conference titles and three times played in the NCAA Tournament. Howard then served one season as a student-assistant coach under Crum before moving to IUPUI.

Howard and his wife, Patti, have two children - Adam, 12, and Katie, 9.

2012 CLINIC SPEAKERS

Virgil Sweet, former Valparaiso High School coach

Virgil Sweet is widely known for what is known in coaching circles as the Valpo Free Throw Method. The former Valparaiso High School coach – who directed the Vikings from 1954-74, helped found the IBCA and for whom IBCA Distinguished Service Awards are named – will teach that method as part of the 2012 IBCA clinic.



It is a technique that helped his teams capture 14 sectionals, including 11 in a row, and two regionals over his 20

seasons. With protégés such as Dale Ciciora, Skip Collins, Bob Punter and Joe Otis guiding the Vikings for all but two of the past 58 seasons, the Valpo Free-Throw Method has lived on and helped contribute to 37 sectional crowns since Sweet arrived in 1954.

Sweet's 1963-64 team shot a national high school team record .792 for the season, and his last 15 teams each shot better than 70 percent from the line with a combined .728 accuracy rate. Of note, former player Mike Copper, retired superintendent of Lawrence Township Schools, set a national record for high school players by making 409 consecutive free throws. Copper is one of 11 players who made 100 or more in a row during practice sessions.

Valparaiso honored Sweet and his legacy during the past season, holding a Virgil Sweet Night on Dec. 27, 2011, as part of a game against Chesterton That night, Sweet shared credit for the Free-Throw Method with Ciciora, his assistant coach of 15 seasons.

"We developed a free throw method with 20 steps, and many of the steps were Dale's suggestions," Sweet said. "The method was a great improvement, and we noticed a big difference on the team. We wrote a book about it, and it told in all 50 states and in five countries."

A 1945 graduate of Covington High School and a 1950 graduate of Eastern Illinois University, Sweet guided his teams to 342 victories in a 25-year career, the last 20 at Valparaiso. Sweet coached two high school All-Americans, 57 players who went on to play in college and 20 who became coaches.

"Coach Sweet is the single most influential person in the history of Viking basketball," Collins said. "VHS basketball, mediocre at best when he arrived, has enjoyed consistent success of the succeeding 55-plus years."

Copper will be on hand and demonstrate free throw technique as Sweet explains each of the 20 steps to those attending the IBCA clinic. They also will explain several Free Throw drills.

Sweet, 84, has been inducted into four basketball halls of fame, including the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 1987. He lives in Largo, Fla., and sells real estate in the St. Petersburg/Clearwater area.

Tom Golumbeck, Griffith

Tom Golumbeck led the Griffith Lady Panthers to an 18-7 record, a second-place finish in the Northwest Crossroads Conference and a sectional championship in 2011-12.



He is 166-84 in his 11 years at Griffith. During his tenure, Golumbeck's teams have won four sectional titles and a regional championship. His teams are consistently ranked in the top 10 in the state for defense. For the 2011-12 season, Griffith allowed just 31.5 points per

game. He was named Girls Basketball Coach of the Year in 2011 by The Times of Northwest Indiana.

Golumbeck currently is a guidance counselor at Griffith High School. He is a 1985 graduate of Highland High School, a 1989 graduate of Indiana University and a 1996 graduate of Purdue University.

Scott Kreiger, Fort Wayne Canterbury

Scott Kreiger has had tremendous success during his tenure as girls basketball coach at Fort Wayne Canterbury.

Kreiger's Cavaliers have compiled a 251-88 record over 14 seasons, including Class A state championships in 2008, 2009, 2010 and 2012. His teams also have won 12 sectionals, six regionals and four semistate crowns.

His most recent squad went 25-2, beating Northeast



Dubois 64-54 in the state title game in Terre Haute. That record matched the mark of his 2009-10 squad as the best record in program history

A 1983 graduate of Columbia City High School and a 1988 graduate of Manchester College, Kreiger played basketball in high school and for one season in college. He began his coaching career in 1984-85, serving for 14 seasons as an assistant coach to his father, Wayne, with the Columbia City girls. He then moved to Canterbury as head coach beginning in 1998-99 and has built that program into a state power.

Kreiger three times has been chosen the Class A state Coach of the Year by the Indiana Coaches of Girls Sports Association, and he was selected the NFHS Indiana Coach of the Year in 2010. He also has been selected to serve as head coach of the 2012 Indiana Girls All-Star Team.

Kreiger, who also has a master's degree from IPFW, teaches high school math at Canterbury. He and his wife, Stacie, have four children - Colten, 22; Cassie, 19; Christian, a freshman at Canterbury; and Cameron, a sixth-grader at Canterbury.

John Steinhilber, Hebron

John Steinhilber has guided the Hebron boys to a 36-10 record over two seasons, including a 23-2 mark in 2011-12 that included Porter County Conference and sectional championships. His team's defensive average of 45.3 is the school's best since 1952, and his 2011 squad was the South County Tournament champions.



A graduate of Boone Grove High School and

Saint Joseph's College, Steinhilber has an overall coaching mark of 157-154 in 14 seasons. He previously coached for six years at South Central (Union Mills) and guided the Satellites to two PCC titles as well as coaching a 2010 Indiana All-Star. He also coached for six seasons at Calumet and led the Warriors to a 2000 sectional title.

Steinhilber worked the IBCA Underclass Showcase in 2009 and 2010 and coached in the 2012 Indiana Elite North-South 2A Junior All-Star game. He also has served as an assistant coach at Andrean, Saint Joseph's College, South Central and Boone Grove.

He and his wife, Melissa, have three sons – Malachi, Isaiah and Xavier.

IBCA INITIATIVE AGAINST CANCER

2011-12 BOYS COACHES OF THE YEAR

Al Gooden New Haven - District I

Al Gooden is a District 1 Coach of the Year after guiding New Haven to a 17-4 record in his first season with the Bulldogs.



Gooden has had outstanding success over the years, compiling a 355-218 record in 24 seasons, including a 321-180 mark in 21 seasons at Harding in Fort Wayne. His stint with the Hawks featured five trips to the IHSAA State Finals, highlighted by the 2001 Class 2A state championship.

A 1977 graduate of Fort Wayne Wayne High School and a 1981 graduate of Ball State University, Gooden began his varsity coaching career in 1988 at Heritage.

Two years later, he moved to Harding and orchestrated one of the state's best teams there for more than two decades. Four state runner-up finishes – 3A in 2002, 2A in 2005, 2A in 2006 and 3A in 2008 – joined the '01 state crown.

He also served as an Indiana All-Star assistant coach in 2005.

Gooden and his wife, Felicia, have three children – Albert Jr., Alicia and Ashley.

Chris Johnson Homestead - District I

Chris Johnson of Homestead is a recipient of District 1 Coach of the Year honors following a 23-3 season that included Northeast Hoosier Conference and sectional championships. A 1983 graduate of Brookville High School and a 1988



graduate of Ball State University, Johnson has been the Spartans' coach for 13 seasons and has compiled a 181-105 record with two sectional titles during his tenure. He previously was coach from 1994-99 at Fort Wayne Bishop Dwenger,

where his teams won three sectionals and two regionals while going 80-35. Johnson's overall record is 261-138 in 18 seasons. He was named an

IBCA District Coach of the Year in 2010, and he will serve as an assistant coach for the 2012 Indiana All-Stars.

Prior to becoming a head coach, Johnson played at Brookville and worked with two fantastic head coaches in Paul Frye at Cincinnati Elder from 1989-1992 and Jim East at Merrillville from 1992-1994. While an assistant under these coaches, Johnson was a part of three sectional and two regional championships.

Johnson is also fortunate to gain knowledge and ideas from his brother, Mark Johnson, head coach at South Bend Riley who has won more than 340 games and multiple sectional and regional championships.

Johnson and his wife, Nicole, have two children – Jade, 21, and Macy, 18.

Scott Heady Carmel - District II

Scott Heady recently completed his second season as coach at Carmel and 23rd year of coaching basketball at the high school level. His 2011-12 team posted a 23-4 record, including Metropolitan Interscholastic Conference, sectional, regional, semistate and state championships.



His career record in 17 seasons as a high school head coach is 249-144.

A graduate of Shenandoah High School and the University

of Indianapolis, Heady began his head coaching career in 1993 at Connersville. He guided the Spartans for two seasons before moving to Warren Central, where he directed the Warriors to two MIC titles, three sectional championships and one regional title over 13 seasons. His 1999-2000 squad won Marion County Tournament, sectional and regional crowns, and he was an IBCA District Coach of the Year that season.

Heady then spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Anderson University, helping the Ravens to a 23-6 record, a Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference championship and NCAA Division III berth in 2009-10. He then returned to Carmel, where he teaches in the school's physical education department.

Following college, Heady was an assistant coach to his father, Bob, for six seasons at Carmel. The highlight of that tenure was helping the Greyhounds reach the State Finals in 1993.

As a player, Heady led his Shenandoah team to the 1981 State Finals and later was a two-year co-captain for Ulndy. He was chosen to the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame's 2006 Silver Anniversary Team.

Heady and his wife, Amy, have three sons – Clayton, Sam and Luke.



Brian Satterfield Hamilton Southeastern - District II

Brian Satterfield recently completed his 11th season as coach at Hamilton Southeastern, where he has compiled a 176-74 record and is the school's all-time winningest coach.

A 1986 graduate of Plainfield High School and a 1990 graduate of Wabash College, Satterfield's Royals posted a 22-3 record in 2011-12, won a school-record 17 consecutive games, claimed their third consecutive



Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship and took the title in the City Securities Hall of Fame Classic.

Satterfield previously was named an IBCA District 3 Coach of the Year in 2002-2003 and coached in the Indiana Class All-Star Classic in New Castle in 2010. He also has been named HCC Coach of the Year for the 2002-2003, 2009-2010, 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 seasons.

high school head coach. He previously coached two seasons at Southwestern (Shelby), guiding the Spartans to a Class A state runner-up finish in 2003, and three seasons at Whiteland.

Meyer graduated from Greensburg in 1990 and played basketball for four seasons for coach Phil Snodgress. While in high school, Meyer scored more than 1,000 points and helped the Pirates win two conference and two sectional championships. He went on to star at Hanover College, playing for coach Mike Beitzel, again topping 1,000 career points and helping the Panthers earn berths in the NCAA Division III national tournament.

Meyer is married to Jennie; the couple has 12-year-old twin daughters, Ashlynn and Bailey.




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2011-12 BOYS COACHES OF THE YEAR

Amy Govert Merrillville - District 1

Amy Govert recently completed her seventh year as the Merrillville High School girls basketball coach with the school's first undefeated regular season.



Govert became the Merrillville girls basketball coach in

2005, and she has compiled a 122-36 record during her time with the Pirates. Her tenure includes Duneland Conference championships in 2006, 2010 and 2012 as well as a Class 4A state runner-up finish in 2010 with a 25-2 record. Her 2011-12 squad finished with a 21-1 mark.

In 2010, Govert was honored as The Times of Northwest Indiana Coach of the Year, the Gary Post-Tribune Coach of the Year and an ICGSA District 1 Coach of the Year. She also was selected an Indiana All-Star assistant coach in 2010.

Steve Neff NorthWood - District I

Thirty-five years ago, when Jimmy Carter was president and the United States was celebrating its bicentennial, Steve Neff took over as girls basketball coach at NorthWood, believing it would be a one-year interim post.

In 2011-12, 35 years later, Neff is a District 1 Coach of

Along the way, NorthWood has posted 34 winning seasons, won 22 sectionals, 10 regionals, two semistates and the 1999 Class 3A state championship. The Panthers also have claimed 10 Northern Lakes Conference titles.

A 1970 graduate of Wakarusa High School and a 1974 graduate of Manchester College, Neff was a four-sport star (baseball, basketball, football and track) in high school. In college, he was the Spartans' baseball MVP and figured he would coach that sport.

Still, he coached junior high boys basketball for one year each at Northfield and Jimtown before returning to his home school - which had consolidated into NorthWood. In addition to teaching science, he also served as an assistant football coach for more than 30 years.

Neff was inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 2006. He and his wife, Becca, have two adult daughters - Stephani and Cori.

Jeff Knoy McCutcheon - District II

Jeff Knoy recently completed his seventh season as coach of the McCutcheon High School girls basketball. His teams have compiled a record of 111-56 during his tenure.



The Mavericks have had a 45-6 record the past two years on their way to a third sectional title, three Journal & Courier Hoops Championships, one Rumble on the River Championship and one regional championship. The Mavericks finished 20-4 in 2011-12, falling in the regional to eventual

Class 4A state champion North Central in overtime.

Knoy has had one Indiana All-Star in Jessica Valley, a 2011 graduate who is currently playing at Indiana State University.

Knoy is a 1986 graduate of Harrison High School in West Lafayette, where he played basketball and football. He matriculated to Purdue University, receiving a bachelor's degree in agriculture education with a minor in U.S. History and economics. Knoy is the social studies department head at McCutcheon.

He previously was a boys' JV coach at McCutheon for 12 seasons, and he also has coached football and baseball.

Knoy and his wife, Peggy, are the parents of Brady (20), Madison (17) and Anabelle (12).



Eric Thornton Norwell - District II

Eric Thornton has had tremendous success as the girls basketball coach at Norwell High School.

A 1987 araduate of Churubusco High School, Thornton attended Ball State and received his bachelor's degree in business education in 1992. He was a student-teacher and volunteer boys basketball assistant coach at Warsaw in 1991-92, then became an assistant girls basketball coach at Plymouth from 1992-97.

Mark Holt Barr-Reeve - District III

Mark Holt directed Barr-Reeve to a 22-1 record and an undefeated regular season in 2011-12 and is recognized as an IBCA District 3 Coach of the Year.

This season's win total set the school record for most wins, the third time in the last four years to best the previous mark. It also included a Blue Chip Conference championship and a Class A Sectional 63 championship. Holt's teams have averaged more than 19 wins per season over the last five years. His overall record with the Lady Vikings is 133-67 in nine seasons.



In his 29 years of teaching mathematics and coaching, all at Barr-Reeve, Holt spent 20 years in the Barr-Reeve boys' basketball program before spending the last nine years as the head coach of the Lady Vikings.

2012 ROY GARDNER AWARD WINNERS

Bob Anderson

Bob Anderson recently completed his 33rd season as an Indiana high school basketball official. During his career, he has worked 30 IHSAA boys basketball tournaments, including five boys State Finals, and he was named the IHSAA/National Federation Officials Association boys basketball Official of the Year in 2006-07.



A 1971 graduate of Purdue University, Anderson started coaching out of college but shifted into officiating because of

officials who influenced him when they called his games. He started officiating basketball in 1979 and worked his first IHSAA tournament in 1983. Over the years, he also has worked three girls basketball State Finals and five football State Finals.

Anderson has served as president of the Indiana Officials Association in 1990-91 as well as other positions with that organization.

He recalls a 1999 boys basketball regional game as his most memorable, a contest that pitted Class 4A No. 1 Bloomington South vs. No. 2 Lawrence North and drew a capacity crowd to the Columbus North gym but stands out for reasons beyond South's 55-50 overtime victory. This is the game in which then-LN senior John Stewart collapsed in the latter part of the third quarter and later that evening passed away.

Anderson is a 1966 graduate of Walter Johnson High School in Bethesda, Md. He then attended Purdue and later received his master's degree from Indiana University in 1975. From 1973-2009, he was a teacher for Indianapolis Public Schools at School #68.

Anderson is married to Susan, and he has three sons and two stepdauahters.

Ray Tebbe

Ray Tebbe comes full circle in receiving the Roy Gardner Award because Gardner was Tebbe's geometry teacher while Tebbe attended Batesville High School.

Tebbe recently completed his 31st season as an Indiana high school basketball official, and he has worked IHSAA basketball tournaments for 30 of those years. Along the way, he has

worked six boys basketball State Finals, three girls basketball State Finals, three football State Finals, five City Securities Hall of Fame Classics (three boys, two girls) and the 1999 Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl (the NCAA Division III football championship game).

Tebbe served as president of the Indiana Officials Association in 1991-92 and was named IHSAA/National Federation Officials Association boys basketball Official of the Year in 1996-97.

A 1970 graduate of Batesville and a 1974 graduate of Ball State with a bachelor's degree in secondary education, Tebbe was a teacher and coach for five years at Shelbyville Middle School. He took a job with Carrier Corp. in 1980, where he still works in the supply chain management group as the sales and operations planning manager.

Tebbe began officiating in 1981 as a way to stay involved with high school athletics, and he recalls two particularly memorable games. One was his first varsity boys basketball game in 1984 at the Elkhart North Side Gym, a game between Elkhart Central and Concord (the Minutemen had a freshman that season named Shawn Kemp). The other was a boys basketball regional game in 1990 at Seymour, the game in which then-Bedford North Lawrence senior Damon Bailey broke the state career scoring record in a 78-58 victory over Scottsburg.

"I called a foul on Damon in the first quarter and all 7,000 fans 'booed' me," Tebbe said. "Even the (Scottsburg) fans. Everyone came to see Damon break the scoring record. When he made the basket to do so (an alley-oop dunk with 5:53 to go in the third quarter), the noise level was so loud for the next three-plus minutes (for a standing ovation for Bailey) that my ears were ringing. Truly unbelievable."

Tebbe and his wife, Denise, have been married for 35 years. They have two adult daughters, Karen and Sara.

Whether as an all-state player on his high school football team or as a member of the Ohio State baseball team, Dr. McCarroll embraced the spirit of competition and teamwork, something that he continues to nurture today as he works diligently with patients to achieve the most desirable outcome possible.

Dr. McCarroll is active in the local, regional and national soccer community and has been an orthopedic consultant to Indiana University athletic teams for 25 years as well as the long-time team physician for Ben Davis High School. Dr. McCarroll has also served as the team physician for two professional soccer teams, the Indiana Blast and the Indiana Twisters.

In 2009, Dr. McCarroll received the Indiana Soccer Hall of Fame's Merit award and was honored by Indiana University Athletics for his 26 years of service.

Married with four children and two perfect grandchildren, McCarroll, is a native of Zanesville, Ohio. He is a member of the American College of Sports Medicine, the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine, the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons, the Indiana Orthopedic Society, the American Medical Association, the International Arthroscopy Association, the International Knee Society and the American Medical Society for Sports Medicine.

Robin Miller District II

Robin Miller graduated from Southport High School in 1967, where he served as a student manager for coach Blackie Braden. Miller was described by Braden as "the worst student manager I ever had. All he does is shoot baskets and give away shoes to his buddies."



Miller then went to Ball State for two quarters and **semistry of the semistry of the semister** at IUPUI before he "got lucky and got hired" by The Indianapolis Star in 1968.

In more than three decades with The Star, Miller covered the Indiana Pacers in their ABA glory days from 1969-72, high school basketball, Indianapolis Caps pro football, Indiana Central University, the Larry Bird days at Indiana State and, of course, the Indianapolis 500.

Racing was Miller's passion as he worked on Indy 500 pit crews from 1970-78 and drove in USAC races from 1975-83. He began writing a racing column in the mid-1970s and in the mid-1980s became a general sports columnist, writing about the Pacers, Indianapolis Colts, high school and college basketball, and racing.

Miller moved in 2001 to ESPN, where he served as an analyst for "RPM 2Nite" and "SportsCenter" as well as writing for the ESPN web site. He joined SPEED network in 2004 and works as an open-wheel racing reporter/analyst for Indy cars as well as covering IndyCar for NBC Sports.

Single for life, Miller treasures his memories of life at The Star, putting out the paper and writing for the city he grew up in. He hates what they did to the high school tournament but still loves to shoot baskets.

Dick Rea District II

Dick Rea is a local TV news veteran who has been a part of the central Indiana sports landscape for more than three decades.

The Lafayette native attended Butler University and began working full-time at WISH-TV (Channel 8) after receiving a bachelor's degree in 1981.



After serving in several capacities for 17 years, Rea left WISH-TV for an opportunity to lead the sports division at WTHR

Channel 13. He was the Sports Executive Producer for WTHR through 2003 and relinquished that role to increase his on-air responsibilities at the station.

In 2006, Rea's career path led him to Methodist Sports Medicine/The Orthopedic Specialists, where he is currently the director of Marketing and Communications. He continues a reduced on-air role at Channel 13 in a freelance capacity.

Michael A. Smith - Athletic Director/Assistant Principal Munster High School - District I

Mike Smith has served as athletic director and assistant principal for the past 12 years at Munster High School, where he has overseen a Mustangs program that has won 123 conference championships, 91 sectionals, 36 regionals, five semistates and one state title. He also oversees a Dance team that has won five state titles and one national title.



Smith has served as host for numerous IHSAA tournaments in boys and girls basketball, football, baseball, volleyball, wrestling, boys and girls golf, boys and girls cross country, boys and girls soccer, and boys and girls tennis.

Previously, Smith was a teacher and coach in Logansport from 1969-91, then became the Logansport High School athletic director from 1991-99. He was an assistant principal and athletic director for one year at Logansport Middle School before moving to his current position in the fall of 2000.

While at Munster, Smith has updated and computerized the constitution and by-laws for the Northwest Crossroads Conference, developed and administered a conference web site and initiated annual conference yearbooks for the Northwest Crossroads and Lake Athletic conferences. While at Logansport, he reinstituted an annual conference yearbook for the North Central Conference and helped initiate and co-chaired the Special Olympics program. Grant Nesbit joined Lawrence North in 2001 as Assistant Athletic Director and was promoted to Athletic Director in 2003. An Indianapolis native, Nesbit earned his bachelor's degree at Ball State University, his master's degree and building-level administrative license at Butler University, and his specialist degree and superintendent's license at Ball State University.

He played football (three letters) and baseball (four letters) at Wheaton College in Wheaton, III. He was also named six times to Wheaton's Academic Dean's list.

Curt Cavin District III

Curt Cavin is in his 25th year as a sports reporter for The Indianapolis Star. While best known for motor sports coverage, Cavin has invested much of his career in Indiana basketball at the high school and college levels.

His father, Mark, played on a semistate finalist (Lebanon 1961), which explains why Curt's favorite player was Rick Mount. Cavin always has had a passion for the high school tournament, spending sectional nights as a youngster filling out brackets on 3x5 cards.

Covering the 1990 State Finals at the RCA Dome – the year that Damon Bailey and Bedford North Lawrence won the championship – remains one of his favorite moments. Among his proudest endeavors: Writing The Star's famous Shootin' the Stars column and offering input to the Indiana All-Star game director through much of the 1990s.

A Western High School and Franklin College graduate, Cavin lives in Mooresville with his wife, Becky, and children Katie and Quinn.

Arv Koontz District III

Arv Koontz has been covering high school basketball in Jackson County since 1972 while working for the Seymour Tribune and Jackson County Banner.

He estimates he has covered more than 1,500 games in more than 70 gymnasiums from Connersville to Evansville and from Indianapolis to Corydon and has been on many ice- and snow-covered roads.

Koontz has covered several Indiana All-Stars and all-state players, and numerous Hall of Fame players and coaches. They include Seymour High School graduates Julie VonDielingen and Teri Moren, former Bedford North Lawrence standout Damon Bailey and current college players Kristin Turner and Erin Murphy.

Before coming to Seymour, Koontz covered high school basketball in DeKalb, III., for 11 years – meaning he has covered high school sports for 51 years.

Koontz received the IHSAA's Distinguished Service Media Award in 1989-90 and was the winner of the Indiana Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association Corky Lamm Award as state Sportswriter of the Year in 1990. He also has been honored over the years by the Indiana Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association, the Indiana Football Coaches Association and the Indiana High School Swimming Coaches Association.

During his career, Koontz has covered state meets and tournaments in 14 sports and he was inducted into the Seymour Bowling Hall of Fame as a sportswriter in 1985.

Pete Swanson District III

Pete Swanson has served the youth of Indiana, Illinois and Ohio as a sports journalist for 57 years, 21 of the past 23 years as sports editor of the Princeton Daily Clarion.

A Chicago native who attended Arlington (III.) High School, Swanson earned a journalism degree from the University of Illinois in 1961.

He began writing while in high school for the Arlington Heights (III.) Herald, then continued writing while attending college for the Champaign (III.) News-Gazette and Champaign-Urbana (III.) Courier. He worked briefly for the Chicago City News Bureau in 1961 before moving to the Elyria (Ohio) Chronicle-Telegram from 1961-65. He had a brief tenure with the Lima (Ohio) News in 1965, then shifted to a long stop with the Evansville Sunday Courier & Press from 1965-86.

Swanson was a freelance writer only from 1986-88, then accepted the position as sports editor of the Princeton Daily Clarion on Jan. 2, 1989. He served in that role through March 2006 before a 23-month retirement. He returned as the PDC sports editor in March 2008 and remains active in that role covering Princeton, Gibson Southern and Wood Memorial high schools, Oakland City University and other Gibson County sports at all levels.

During his tenure in Evansville, Swanson covered Southern Illinois prep sports and many other events, including Double-A Southern League baseball when Evansville had that from 1966-68; and Triple-A American Association baseball when Evansville had that from 1970-84. He also served as a correspondent for The Sporting News from 1966-86 as well as president of the American Association Baseball Writers from August 1974 until August 1975.

Swanson won first place in an Ohio UPI statewide sportswriting contest in 1962, second place in an Indiana sportswriting contest in 1985 and was inducted into the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in April 1986. He received the IHSAA Distinguished Media Service Award in 2000 and a Media Award from the Indiana High School Baseball Coaches Association in 2011. He also was recognized with a "Pete Swanson Day" in Princeton in October 2003.

Swanson, 73, is the son of Paul and Florence DeMack Swanson. He has been married for more than 17 years to his wife, Donna. He has one son, Paul, principal at West Elementary School in Mount Vernon, Ind.; two step-sons, Carl and Chris Fenwick; and three grandchildren.

Jerrill Vandeventer - Superintendent

Greater Jasper Consolidated Schools - District III Jerrill Vandeventer is the superintendent of

Greater Jasper Consolidated Schools and a strong believer in the benefit of high school athletics. A former successful basketball coach, Vandeventer has served in school administration for



deventer has served in school administration for 17 years, the last six as superintendent of Greater Jasper Schools. Vandeventer was a varsity basketball coach for 11 seasons,

compiling a 147-96 record with three conference titles, three co-Evansville city championships and one sectional crown. He coached four years at Owen Valley, three years at Boonville and four years at Evansville Harrison. His best seasons were 21-2 at Boonville in 1985-86 and 20-2 at Evansville Harrison in 1988-89.

He coached 10 players who went on to play college basketball, including Calbert Cheaney, Walter McCarty, Chris Lowery, Brent Kell and Brad Brownell. Cheaney and McCarty went on to play in the NBA, and Cheaney, McCarty, Lowery and Brownell all have become college or NBA coaches.

Vandeventer began his career in education in 1975 as an industrial arts teacher at Mooresville High School. He was an industrial arts and health teacher at Tri-Central High School from 1976-78, then an industrial arts teacher at Tell City for 1978-79. He was an industrial arts teacher at Owen Valley High School from 1979-83, then a physical education teacher at Boonville High School from 1978-76. He was an asistant principal at Evansville Harrison High School from 1986-95 before moving to Greater Jasper Schools. There he was an asistant superintendent from 1995-2006 and superintendent from 2006-present.

A 1971 graduate of Bloomfield High School, Vandeventer attended Milligan College and Purdue University, earning his bachelor's degree from Purdue in 1975. He received his master's degree from Indiana State in 1980 and a degree in secondary administration from Indiana State in 1986. He completed the Educational Specialist at Indiana State in 1997 and received his doctorate's degree from Indiana State in 2005.

2012 COACHES' ROUNDTABLE PARTICIPANTS

A roundtable of former coaches is one of the items planned for the 2012 IBCA Spring Clinic. This year's panel features a trio of Hall of Fame coaches – Mike Broughton, Jim Miller and Ed Siegel – who will offer their expertise on building programs that stand the test of time.

Mike Broughton

Mike Broughton coached Indiana high school basketball at the varsity level for 21 years, compiling a career record of 350-145 in stops at Hebron, Rushville, Castle and Jeffersonville.

moved to Rushville for three seasons (29-37) and Castle for six

(81-55) before a 10-year stint at Jeffersonville (210-40). His

A native of Hebron, Broughton began his head coaching career in 1979 at his alma mater for two seasons (30-13). He



time with the Red Devils included the 1993 state championship, five Hoosier Hills Conference titles and duties as the 1996 Indiana All-Star head coach.

As a high school coach, Broughton's teams won nine sectionals, five regionals and three semistates. He was honored five times as HHC Coach of the Year, twice recognized as a Hoosier Basketball Coaches Association Coach of the Year and was the 1993 Indiana Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association state Coach of the Year.

Broughton moved to the college ranks in 2000, first as an assistant to Barry Collier for three seasons at the University of Nebraska. He then became head coach at Southern Nazarene University, an NAIA school in Bethany, Okla. His teams there went 109-55 mark in five seasons, including two NAIA national tournament appearances.

Broughton currently is Athletic Director at Jennings County High School and is a 2012 inductee into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame. He and his wife, Pat, have three children and five grandchildren.

Jim Miller

Jim Miller posted a 607-251 record in 37 seasons as an Indiana high school boys basketball coach at six schools, finishing his career with an 11-year stint at New Albany and twice taking teams to the State Finals in the non-class format.



Previously, Miller coached at Cloverdale, Penn, Kokomo Haworth, Warsaw and Huntington North. Together, his teams won 16 conference championships, two Putnam County champi-

onships, seven holiday tournaments, 18 sectionals, five regionals and two semistates – advancing to the final four with Cloverdale in 1966 and New Albany in 1994.

His 1965-66 team at Cloverdale had the state's best record at 27-2, which came as part of a 40-game regular-season winning streak. At New Albany, his teams compiled a 51-game home-court winning streak.

Miller took his expertise international, working at clinics in Africa in 1984 and in Australia in 1988, 1989 and 1990, and he received multiple awards for his excellence. He was an IBCA District Coach of the Year in 1975 at Penn as well as in 1992 and 1994 at New Albany.

Also, Miller was an assistant coach for the Indiana All-Stars in 1988 and the Indiana nominee for National Coach of the Year in 1988. In addition, he coached in a National East-West All-Star Game in 1995 in Atlanta. He had a 6-2 record as coach of various all-star games.

A 1954 graduate of Avon High School and a 1959 graduate of Franklin College, Miller has been inducted into both schools' halls of fame – Avon in 2008 and Franklin College in 1995. He also was inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 2004 and the Penn High School Hall of Fame in 2011.



Ed Siegel

Ed Siegel coached 33 years of Indiana high school basketball with tenures at Stillwell (two years), Southwestern (Shelby) (two years), Boonville (four years) and Pike (25 years). During that span, Siegel's teams compiled a 458-229 record while winning 22 different championships.



While at Pike, from 1970-95, the Red Devils won the school's first conference, Marion County Tournament, sectional and regional championships. Along the way, he also coached

four Indiana All-Stars, served as an Indiana All-Star assistant coach in 1989 and was recognized with the Sagamore of the Wabash award from Gov. Otis Bowen in 1980.

Siegel's teams won six sectionals (two at Boonville and four at Pike) as well as two regionals (both at Pike), and he collected Coach-of-the-Year honors on 15 occasions.

A native of New Albany, Siegel was a member of New Albany's first Final Four team in 1950 and earned seven varsity letters at the school. He then played four seasons at Franklin College, three years as a starting guard, and earned 10 varsity letters. He later served in the U.S. Army and earned a master's degree in economics from Indiana University.

While a coach, Siegel served on the IBCA Board of Directors from 1978-82, was president of the IBCA in 1980 and conducted the IBCA weekly coaches' poll from 1978-95. He also served as on-court director of the Hoosier Basketball Magazine Top 40 Senior Workout from 1988-95 and was an IBCA clinic director from 1979-95.

Siegel was inducted into the Franklin College Athletic Hall of Fame in 1995 and the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 1997. In 2004, the Pike High School basketball facility was named the Edward A. Siegel Gymnasium.

Since 1998, Siegel has served on the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame's Board of Directors and has chaired the Silver Anniversary Team and Hall of Fame Classic selection committees. He currently is a Director Emeritus for the Indiana Basketball of Fame.

Siegel and his wife, Carmen, have three children and five grandchildren.
