IBCA/Subway Player of the Week program

A new item on the IBCA calendar in 2013-14 is the Indiana-Kentucky
Challenge Cup, a five-game event between teams from Indiana and Kentucky.
The first Challenge Cup will be Jan. 11 at Freedom Hall in Louisville.
Teams representing Indiana are the Barr-Reeve boys, the Corydon Central boys, the Guerin Catholic boys, the Park Tudor boys and the Roncalli girls.
The event is being coordinated by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Asso-

ciation and the Kentucky Association of Basketball Coaches.

- Boys: Corydon Central vs. Covington Catholic, Ky., about 3 p.m.
- Boys: Park Tudor vs. Hopkinsville, Ky., about 5 p.m.
- Boys: Guerin Catholic vs. Louisville Ballard, Ky., about 7 p.m.

Admission is \$10.00 per person for the entire day of games. Military service veterans and their immediate families will be admitted at no charge. Tickets will be available from participating schools or on game day at Freedom Hall

A best-of-five-game format will determine the winner of the 2014 Challenge Cup. The 10 participating teams feature at least 14 NCAA Division I prospects and has the markings of becoming an outstanding annual event.

Plans are for this event to be hosted at an Indiana site in January 2015. It then will continue to rotate between the states following years. There will be an actual "Challenge Cup" that will be displayed at the basketball Hall of Fame of the winning state for years it prevails.

Proceeds from the 2014 inaugural event will go to the Wounded Warrior Program as well as the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame and the Kentucky High School Basketball Hall of Fame.

January is 'Coaches vs. Cancer' month

The IBCA again has designated January as "Coaches vs. Cancer" month for high school Basketball in Indiana. In the first six years of this initiative, boys' and girls' coaches across Indiana raised nearly \$600,000. In 2012-13 coaches, teams and communities stepped up to raise \$113,000. That makes the six-year total from Indiana basketball coaches more than \$586,000.

For 2013-14, ideally pick a date in January for a "Coaches vs. Cancer" game. If not January, please pick a date that works for you and host a "Coaches vs. Cancer" game.

The American Cancer Society also will present banners to programs that meet certain levels of donations. Categories are Champion (\$10,000 or more), MVP (\$5,000 to \$9,999) and All Star (\$2,500 to \$4,999).

This January, we are asking every IBCA boys' and girls' coach to select a game to promote "Coaches vs. Cancer."

All participating schools will be recognized this year on www.coachesvscancerindiana.org; those raising a total of \$2,500 or more through all sports will receive a "Coaches vs. Cancer" recognition banner imprinted with the school's name. To be eligible, all funds raised from throughout the school year must be turned into the local American Cancer Society office no later than June 1, 2014.

"We are very proud of Indiana high schools," said American Cancer Society Coaches vs. Cancer specialist Beth Campbell, who helps coordinate the IBCA initiative while overseeing ACS efforts in Indiana, Illinois and Michigan. "And we are extremely proud of our partnership with the IBCA in this extraordinary campaign.

"The commitment of the coaches, teams, parents and participants makes a real impact in the lives of those touched by the disease. We are truly grateful for the continued support. By working together, we can all join the team to create a world with less cancer and more birthdays."

New NCAA Division I academic requirements for Class of 2016

The NCAA has released an SAT/ACT sliding scale that corresponds with the increased GPA requirements for the class of 2016 and beyond. Any current high school freshman or sophomore who is even remotely considering the possibility of playing a sport collegiality needs to pay attention. The wiggle room to correct academic shortcomings has been greatly reduced.

Here is a summary if the NCAA Division I academic requirements for a Full Qualifier that take effect for the class of 2016 and beyond:

The minimum core course GPA has increased from 2.00 to 2.30. 10 of the 16 core course requirements must be satisfied prior to the start of the senior year.

 $\vec{7}$ of those 10 core courses must be from English, Math and Science subsections.

Grades earned in the 10 core courses are "locked in" for the purposes of calculating the final core course GPA.

Any retakes of the first 10 core courses must be completed prior to senior year.

The NCAA also has introduced a new status for the class of 2015 – the "Academic Redshirt." An "Academic Redshirt" may receive a scholarship and practice with his/her team, but he/she may not participate in game competition as a college freshman. Students with a GPA of 2.30 or above may achieve either "Academic Redshirt" or "Full Qualifier" status, depending on their SAT/ACT test scores. Students with a core course GPA between 2.00 and 2.29 cannot attain "Full Qualifier" status but may achieve "Academic Redshirt" status by meeting minimum sliding scale test score requirements.

The new sliding SAT/ACT scale results in significant changes in minimum test score requirements. The minimum SAT score required to compete as a college freshman increased by 180 points while the minimum ACT score increased by an average of 14 points (sum score).

Here are two examples of changes to the new sliding scale:

Example

Prior to 2016: 2.00 core course GPA + 1010 SAT or 86 ACT = Full Qualifier 2016 and after: 2.00 core course GPA + 1020 SAT or 86 ACT = Academic Redshirt

Example 2

Prior to 2016: 2.50 core course GPA + 820 SAT or 68 ACT = Full Qualifier 2016 and after: 2.50 core course GPA + 1000 SAT or 85 ACT = Full Qualifier Remember, the NCAA does not include the writing component of the SAT or ACT and the ACT score is a sum score (not average) of the English, math, reading and science sections.

Finally, just because a student-athlete meets the minimum NCAA academic standards, it does not mean they will be admitted to play sports at the college of their choice. Many universities have academic standards for incoming freshman athletes that are higher than the NCAA minimum requirements.

What does all this mean? Student-athletes must start tracking courses early. A student-athlete should calculate his/her initial core course GPA at the conclusion of his/her first semester in high school and continue to do so each semester thereafter.

Now more than ever, every semester counts.





2013-2014 Coaching Changes

From the beginning of last season through September 2013, 138 people have been hired as new varsity basketball coaches in Indiana high schools -- 67 to boys basketball positions and 71 to girls basketball positions -- for the 2013-14 season.

The number of changes is fewer than the 2012 off-season, and the total is well short of the 188 changes made in the spring and summer of 2007.

According to data compiled by HickoryHusker.com, here are the number of changes for the 13 years prior to the 2013 off-season: 2012 – 167; 2011 - 154; 2010 - 162; 2009 - 146; 2008 - 148; 2007 - 188; 2006 - 152; 2005 - 146; 2004 - 147; 2003 - 141; 2002 - 135; 2001 - 139; 2000 - 125; 1999 - 129; 1998 - 133.

INAUGURAL NATIONAL RISING SENIOR ACADEMY IN INDY A HUGE SUCCESS

The inaugural national Rising Senior Academy was held at Ben Davis High School in July 2013.

I could go on and on about the good things that are happening with the All-Star Series.





2013 Championship coaches

Boys

Class 4A: Scott Heady, Carmel. Heady guided the Greyhounds to a 25-2 record and they defeated Cathedral 57-53 in the state championship game. Heady is 58-19 in three seasons at Carmel and 274-146 in 18 seasons as a high school head coach. He previously coached at Connersville and Warren Central. Heady is a graduate of Shenandoah High School and the University of Indianapolis.

Class 3A: Stacy Meyer, Greensburg. Meyer directed the Pirates to a 26-1 season, including a 73-70 win over Fort Wayne Concordia in overtime for the 3A state title. Meyer has a record of 118-47 in seven seasons at Greensburg and is 176-103 in 12 seasons as a head coach. A graduate of Greensburg and Hanover College, he previously was head coach at Southwestern (Shelby) and Whiteland.

Class 2A: Marvin Rea, Bowman Academy. Rea's Eagles went 18-9 last season, including claiming the Class 2A state championship with an 86-73 victory over Linton-Stockton. Rea is 97-41 in six seasons as coach at Bowman Academy. He is a graduate of Gary Roosevelt, where he was named winner of the IHSAA Trester Award in 1987. He later played two seasons at Purdue, graduating in 1991. His Bowman team also was a state champion in 2010.

Class A: Doc Nash, Borden. Nash coached the Braves to a 55-50 victory over Triton for the Class A state championship to cap a 24-3 season. Nash, a 1997 graduate of New Washington High School and a 2002 graduate of Manchester College, is 116-49 in seven seasons at Borden. Nash previously was the JV coach for four seasons at Austin. He played basketball for two seasons at Olney Central College and for two seasons at Manchester College.





Girls

Class 4A: Kurt Godlevske, Bedford North Lawrence. Godlevske directed the Lady Stars to a 28-0 record, including a 54-51 victory over Fort Wayne South for the 4A state championship. He guided the BNL girls to a 120-41 record in seven seasons and accepted a job as a women's basketball assistant at Butler University late last spring. Godlevske was a men's basketball assistant at Lake Superior State University in Michigan, a boys' head coach at L'Anse (Mich) High, a boys' assistant at Lawrence North and a boys' and girls' head coach at Newberry (Mich.) High. His overall record as a head coach is 177-116. He is a graduate of L'Anse High School and Northern Michigan University.

Class 3A: Julie Shelton, Mt. Vernon (Fortville). Shelton guided the Marauders to a 61-47 triumph over Hamilton Heights for the Class 3A state title, capping a 23-4 season. It was the second consecutive state finals appearance for Shelton, who has compiled a 242-102 record in 16 seasons at Mt. Vernon. Shelton was a star player at Seymour High School, helping the Owls to the 1987 state finals, and Butler University, where she still holds the school's all-time scoring record. She was an assistant basketball coach and head volleyball coach at Mt. Vernon before becoming the varsity girls basketball coach.

Class 2A: Steve Goans, Evansville Mater Dei. Goans directed the Wildcats to a 28-2 mark that included a 62-42 win over Eastern (Greentown) for a second consecutive state championship. Goans has posted a 109-37 record the past six seasons at Mater Dei and has a 181-120 mark in two stints with the Wildcats totaling 15 seasons (he has coached the team from 1980-89 and from 2007-present). Goans is a 1976 graduate of Mater Dei, and his teams won sectionals in 1986, 2010, 2012 and 2013.

Class A: Wayne Kreiger, Fort Wayne Canterbury. Kreiger took over the Cavaliers last season and guided the team to a 25-3 season, including a 42-35 victory over Vincennes Rivet in the Class A state championship game. Kreiger was the longtime coach at Columbia City, guiding the Eagles to a 520-222 record over 33 seasons from 1977-2010. He also coached in the West Noble and Huntington County school systems and was the Columbia City boys' basketball coach for two years before taking over the girls' program. Kreiger, a Canterbury girls' assistant for two years after leaving Columbia City and before becoming the Cavs' head coach, was inducted to the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 2006. He graduated from Huntington Township High School in 1960 and Manchester College in 1964.

NFHS rule changes for 2013-14

Head coaches in high school basketball will be allowed to come onto the court in an effort to break up a fight or keep a situation from escalating. Previously, the head coach could only enter the court if beckened by an official.

This revision to Rule 10-4-5 was one of five rules changes approved by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Basketball Rules Committee at its April 15-17, 2013, meeting in Indianapolis. All rules changes were subsequently approved by the NFHS Board of Directors.

While the head coach and his/her assistants must continue to ensure that players remain on the bench during a fight, the committee agreed that the presence of the head coach on the court could be instrumental in preventing the situation from escalating, and the coach also could assist game officials in controlling the situation.

"By removing the requirement of the head coach being beckoned onto the floor by the officials, it should result in a more expedient resolution of the situation and restoration of order," said Theresia Wynns, NFHS director of sports and officials education. "The change also will allow the officials a greater opportunity to assess appropriate penalties by being able to observe the situation because of the increased assistance the head coach(es) will provide by their presence."

In other changes, the rules committee approved the use of electronic devices during the game in certain instances. Rule 1-19 now will allow a coach to take advantage of electronic devices for use in coaching and gathering statistics.

Teams, however, cannot use electronic equipment for voice communication with players on the court, and the use of electronic audio and/or video devices are not allowed to review a decision of the contest officials.

In an effort to thwart the use of leg-compression sleeves for non-medical reasons, the committee added leg-compression sleeves to the requirements of arm-compression sleeves in Rule 3-5-3.

Leg-compression sleeves shall be white, black, beige or a single solid school color; shall be the same color for each team member; must meet the logo requirements in Rule 3-6; and must only be worn for medical reasons.

The final rules change approved by the committee for the 2013-14 season will permit a single, visible manufacturer's logo/trademark/reference on the team jersey, not to exceed $2^{1}/_{4}$ square inches with no dimension more than $2^{1}/_{4}$ inches. The manufacturer's logo may be located no more than 5 inches below the shoulder seam on the front of the jersey, or 2 inches from the neckline on the back of the jersey, or in either side insert.

Wynns said this change will bring basketball in agreement with other NFHS sports rules and allow the use of a single manufacturer's logo on the jersey of the playing uniform.

In addition to these rules changes, the committee approved a new defensive tip signal that will be added to the Basketball Officials Manual. This signal will be given by the official when the ball enters the backcourt as a result of contact with the defensive player.

Basketball is the second-most popular sport for girls and third-most popular for boys at the high school level, according to the 2011-12 High School Athletics Participation Survey conducted by the NFHS, with 435,885 girls and 535,289 boys participating nationwide. The sport ranks first in school sponsorship of girls and boys teams with 17,768 schools sponsoring the sport for girls and 18,099 sponsoring the sport for boys.
